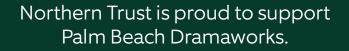

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### NOTE FROM THE PRODUCING ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



Welcome to *The Humans*, Stephen Karam's Tony Award-winning play that takes place around a funny and unsettling Thanksgiving family dinner and unfolds in real time.

As many of you are aware, after a long absence I returned to acting – my first love – three seasons ago, and was most recently part of the cast of our previous play, Ronald Harwood's *The Dresser*. When you're in a show, as opposed to running a theatre or even directing, you observe things from a different vantage point. You spend several weeks in a rehearsal hall, have three days of tech rehearsals, then settle in at the theatre for eight performances a week. During

that time, you become keenly aware on a daily basis of the many people audiences never see – and some they aren't even aware of – who are the backbone of every production. I'm talking about everybody from the people in the scene shop who build the sets, to the crew that arrives early every night and sets up the stage, to the wardrobe supervisor who (among other things) stays long after the play is over to clean the costumes.

One of the takeaways from *The Dresser* is "don't take anything or anyone for granted." And it made me realize that we don't give these talented, hard workers enough credit. So, I'd like to express my gratitude and give a shout out to the people working behind the scenes whose bios you don't see in the playbill: Doug Wilkinson, technical director and Kira Barnes, assistant technical director and lead carpenter, who build our incomparable sets; Julia Howe, stage crew lead who, along with Anna-Teressa Soto-Andujar, assistant stage manager, prepare the stage nightly, execute the scene changes and, essentially, manage the backstage area; Jane Lynch, wardrobe supervisor as well as wig designer and hair stylist; Keshin Martin, audio engineer and technical assistant; and Jillian Feigenblat, head of properties and shop assistant, who curates and crafts all the props.

There's one other thing I'd like to share. A playwright from Orlando attended the Perlberg Festival of New Plays, which was his first time at PBD. He approached me at the end of a reading to tell me how numerous patrons came up to him, this stranger, and greeted him. He said that in all his years of theatregoing, this was a first; he never felt so welcome at a theatre. I can't say I was entirely surprised, but I want to thank our wonderful patrons for their generosity of spirit.

Enjoy The Humans.

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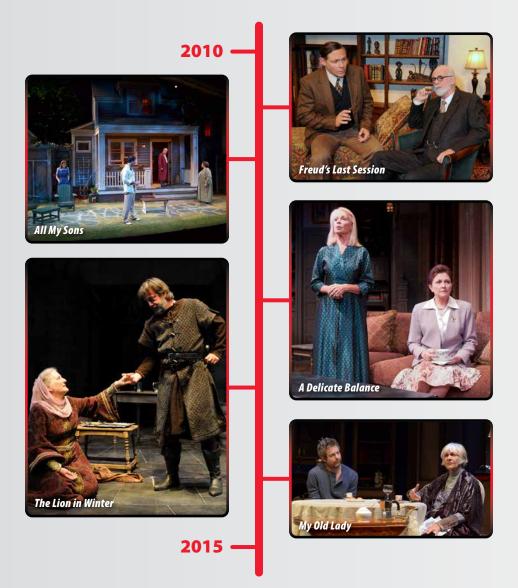
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## **FIVE YEAR LOOKBACK**

In the third installment of PBD memories, we look back at 2010-11 to 2014-15, the transitional period when the company made the move from Banyan Boulevard to the Don & Ann Brown Theatre. The state-of-the-art venue enabled the company to go bigger onstage – larger casts, more expansive sets – while retaining the intimacy in the audience chamber that patrons loved.



#### 2010-2011 Freud's Last Session

Playwright: Mark St. Germain | Director: William Hayes

Before *Freud's Last Session* had its world premiere at Barrington Stage, before it triumphed Off-Broadway and internationally, before the hit production at PBD featuring Chris Oden (left) and Dennis Creaghan during the company's final season on Banyan, before it became a film, PBD helped develop the play with several readings. One was seen by the playwright, who stayed a few days to discuss the script and do more work. "I like to think that reading played some part in the play's ultimate commercial success," says Creaghan.

#### **2011-2012** All My Sons

Playwright: Arthur Miller | Director: J. Barry Lewis

PBD inaugurated the Don & Ann Brown Theatre with Miller's searing play about guilt, responsibility, and integrity for a few reasons. Aside from the lure of Miller's name, Producing Artistic Director William Hayes wanted to show patrons what the company was capable of in its new home. Michael Amico built the company's first two-story set -- "it was large and gorgeous and took over the stage, yet the feeling of intimacy remained," says Hayes. #### 2012-2013 A Delicate Balance

Playwright: Edward Albee | Director: William Hayes

Our seventh Albee play introduced PBD audiences to Maureen Anderman, one of the foremost interpreters of the playwright's work. By now, Albee was quite familiar with PBD, but getting the rights to the play was taking longer than usual and delaying the company's announcement of the 2012-13 season. #### 2013-2014 The Lion in Winter

Playwright: James Goldman | Director: William Hayes

Set in 1183, this classic comedy-drama about the dysfunctional House of Plantagenet is historically based. But, as Goldman noted, "The people in this play, their personalities and passions, while consistent with the facts we have, are fictions." PBD's production, led by Tod Randolph (left) and C. David Johnson, included a clever, massive turntable by Amico, and remarkable period costumes by Brian O'Keefe.

#### 2014-2015 My Old Lady

The legendary Estelle Parsons was 87 when she made her PBD debut, and very much at the top of her game. Critical response included "amazing energy and forcefulness," "disappears inside" her 92-year-old character, and "flawless." Also appearing with the company for the first time was Tim Altmeyer (seen here with Parsons), who received accolades for his performance.

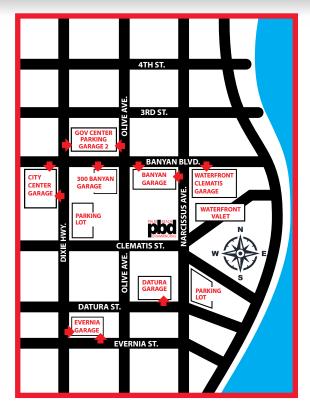

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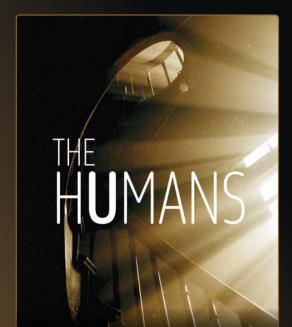

In addition, he wrote a film adaptation of Anton Chekhov's The Seagull starring Annette Bening, which was released by Sony Picture Classics. His adaptation of Chekhov's The Cherry Orchard premiered on Broadway as part of Roundabout's 2016 season. Recent honors include the inaugural Horton Foote Playwriting Award, the inaugural Sam Norkin Drama Desk Award, two Outer Critics Circle Awards, a Lucille Lortel Award, Drama Leage Award, and Hull-Warriner Award. began designing for PBD in 2009, became costume shop manager and resident designer in 2015, and has designed over 65 shows here. He has received 11 Carbonell Award nominations, winning for Les Liaisons Dangereuses, The Lion in Winter, and A Doll's House, and was a Silver Palm Award recipient in 2022. A graduate of UNC-Chapel Hill, he spent his earlier career as a patternmaker for the Shakespeare Theatre in Washington, DC and major costume houses in New York, including Barbara Matera, Ltd., Parsons-Meares, Michael-Jon Costumes, and Eaves-Brooks. He was later resident designer, principal patternmaker, and shop manager for Seaside Music Theatre in Daytona Beach, spending 16 years designing over 75 productions and supervising 90 more. In 2019, she earned certifications from the summer school program at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts. She is very proud to have joined the PBD staff as assistant stage manager; her first show was Lost in Yonkers, followed by The Dresser. Other credits include working for the Broadway company Aurora Productions as wardrobe supervisor on The Tempest at the Colonial Theatre in Westerly, Rhode Island; stage manager for Prague Shakespeare Company's student show in Czech Republic; and stage manager for Theatre Lab's 2023 New Play Festival. Roundabout has been recognized for its varied work on five stages, reaching more than 700,000 theatregoers and 18,000 students and teachers each year. Roundabout Underground's program for new playwrights was launched with Stephen Karam's Speech & Debate. The Humans was his second play commissioned by Roundabout. Christopher Ashley was named Roundabout's artistic director in September 2024, succeeding longtime artistic director Todd Haimes, who died in 2023.

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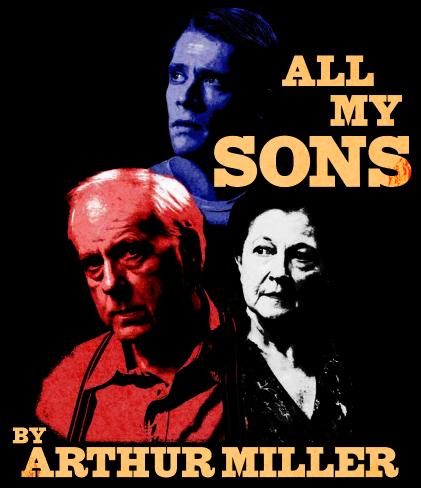
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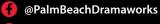
