He had so much confidence in us as leaders. He trusted us because he worked so closely with us; nobody has ever known us better. He knew what we stood for. He could predict how we would react to certain situations. Over time, as he got to know us more and more, he invested more in PBD. And it wasn't about investing in the two of us; it was about investing in the organization. He knew we built it for longevity, to survive well into the future when we were no longer involved. He loved PBD so much, and wanted to be a part of the company and have his name associated with it.

He always stepped up. We use the three Ts: he gave very generously of his time, his talent, and his treasure. For the rest of our lives, when we have a dilemma or a challenge, we will say, "What would Mark do right now? What would he say right now?"

He was that person for us. And because we knew him so well, and know the kind of person he was, we'll find the answer.

One thing we're sure of right now is that Mark would want us to keep looking ahead and moving forward. So, we want to let you know that subscriptions are now on sale for our 2025-26 season. It's made up of a diverse and impressive array of four acclaimed plays and one world premiere, each of which, in its own way, speaks with an immediacy to today's audiences. 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Graham Cracker Simple Syrup:

- 1/4 cup honey
- ³⁄₄ cup brown sugar
- 3 cinnamon sticks
- 1 cup water
- 1 tsp vanilla

- 1. Start by making the *Graham Cracker Simple Syrup* by combining ¹/₄ cup honey, ³/₄ cup brown sugar, 3 cinnamon sticks, and 1 cup water in a saucepan. Heat on medium until the sugar has melted, then remove from heat and add 1 teaspoon of vanilla. Let cool then strain.
- 2. Add a large ice cube to a rocks glass, then top it with 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ounces of bourbon (you can also make this in a mixing glass, then pour it into a rocks glass with ice once mixed).
- 3. Top with 34 ounces of the syrup and bitters, to taste. Stir to combine.
- 4. Garnish and enjoy in the great outdoors!



2015-2016 1776

When Clive Cholerton and Producing Artistic Director William Hayes decided to approach 1776 in a new way, most people – including members of the cast and crew – doubted they could pull it off. The original Broadway production featured a cast of 26; PBD's brilliant production had 13 actors and all of them, except for Gary Cadwallader as John Adams (photo, with Laura Hodos as Abigail Adams) were double cast, usually playing a character from each side of the political divide. "Our casting was gender neutral and ethnically neutral," says Cholerton. "There have been many productions of 1776 in recent years that have now made this concept ubiquitous, but PBD was the first to do it."

2016-2017 Sweeney Todd

Music & Lyrics: Stephen Sondheim | Book: Hugh Wheeler | Director: Clive Cholerton

Hayes chose to produce *Sweeney Todd* not just because it's one of musical theatre's masterpieces, but believing it would attract new and younger audiences. His hunch paid off – even though the show didn't (financially, that is). PBD started a "pay your age" initiative for those 40 and under, and most performances sold out. "We introduced hundreds of young people to live theatre, but we didn't make any money because of the deeply discounted tickets," says Hayes. "But it was worth it for many reasons, including the way these young people used social media to promote the show. And many have returned for other productions. *Sweeney Todd* had a huge impact on PBD." Pictured: Shane Tanner in the title role.

Why did a teenage boy who literally worships horses commit the unspeakable act of blinding six of them? That is the mystery a psychiatrist must unravel in order to help his disturbed young patient (Steven Maier in photo) in this psychological thriller. Critics called PBD's production "vivid, visceral, intense and searing," "beautifully crafted," and "perfectly executed."

Troy Maxson, denied a shot at the major leagues because of the color of his skin, is an embittered sanitation worker who fractures family relationships and thwarts dreams. "Bill assembled an amazing cast, and thanks to his direction, the spectacular set, props, costumes, lighting, and sound, it felt like we were stepping into another time with each performance," says Karen Stephens, who played Troy's wife, Rose (pictured with Lester Purry). "Playing Rose allowed me to tap into a place of love, pain, and urgency that made the experience visceral and unforgettable."

Elizabeth Dimon (pictured) had long wanted to create a work about Gertrude Berg – better known to many as Molly Goldberg – and Hayes ultimately commissioned this world premiere play. It was an honor to bring her to a modern audience because she deserves to be remembered."

THE SEAFARER By Conor McPherson DECEMBER 12- 28

It's a devil of a homecoming when Sharky Harkin returns to Dublin on Christmas Eve to look after his belligerent, alcoholic brother, Richard, who's recently gone blind. Two of their old boozy friends join them for an evening of drinking and poker, and one of them brings along a newcomer, the portentous Mr. Lockhart, who compels Sharky to confront his past. This suspenseful, dark, and humorous fable is a powerful and ultimately moving tale about second chances and redemption.

DRIVING MISS DAISY By Alfred Uhry FEBRUARY 6-22
